# **Clinical Mission Updates**

The Division of General Internal Medicine is getting ready to launch the innovative Hospital Medicine Clinical Scholars Program for academic year 2017-2018. The program, founded by Arthur Evans, MD, is the first of its kind in the US. It is an intensive faculty development program to foster academic success and personal growth that focuses on five foundational skills: teaching, clinical epidemiology, quality improvement, diagnostic bedside ultrasound, and leadership. The innovative **Diagnostic Bedside Ultrasound Training program** developed by Gregory Mints, MD and Tanping Wong, MD, is the first of its kind for the Department of Medicine. It is being offered to hospitalist faculty, residents, and interns. The hands-on training program is expected to expand in academic year 2017-2018.

# **Research Mission Updates**

Dr. Lisa Kern has been appointed to **Associate Director for Research for Division of General Internal Medicine**, effective May 2017. Dr. Kern received her Bachelor of Arts and Medical Doctor degrees from Harvard Medical School and her MPH from Johns Hopkins Bloomberg School of Public Health, where she was a Robert Wood Johnson Clinical Scholar. She joined the Division of General Internal Medicine in July 2016 as Associate Professor of Medicine and has an active extramurally funded research program studying healthcare fragmentation. She is a distinguished scientist, teacher, and mentor.

**Newly Awarded Grants:** Dr. Kern was recently awarded by the National Heart, Lung, and Blood Institute, an R01 grant in the amount of \$2,923,072 for her project on, *Healthcare Fragmentation and Cardiovascular Outcomes*. The project period for this grant is from May 2017 through April 2021.

# **Education Mission Updates**

**Ernie Esquivel, MD** represented the Division of General Internal Medicine at a faculty development program at Stanford University designed to help attendees improve their own teaching and prepare them to assist other faculty at Weill Cornell to enhance their teaching ability. Dr. Esquivel will offer the "Effective



Clinical Teaching" course for Weill Cornell faculty; it covers key topics that comprise a framework for examining teaching and consists of seven two-hour interactive sessions. Dr. Ernie Esquivel's abstract on "Lessons Learned by Medical Students in Systems-Based Practice" was one of four oral abstract presentations at the recently concluded Clerkship Directors in Internal Medicine meeting in Baltimore, Maryland.

The new and improved **Primary Care Clerkship** is now live—the first group of medical students to rotate through the revamped version of this core clerkship started on April 3<sup>rd</sup>. One major change to the clerkship is the addition of new small "tutor group" teaching sessions, where students present cases to each other from their clinical experience on this rotation, allowing opportunities to build upon their presentation skills and for the entire group to practice developing differential diagnoses.
