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Quality Improvement Academy

On September 25, in light of World Patient Safety Day, **Quality Improvement Academy (QIA)** hosted its first Grand Rounds speaker, **Albert W. Wu, MD**, director of the Johns Hopkins Center for Health Services and Outcomes



Research and Professor of Health Policy and Management and Medicine. Dr. Wu's talk on "Healthcare = People Taking Care of People" addresses the need to recognize and provide support to healthcare workers involved in stressful events related to clinical care. Physicians are under-utilizers of existing resources. Over the next few months, the Quality Improvement and Patient Safety committee will be working on a proposal to create a system of support and outreach for our physician faculty across the department. Requests for applications for the **QIA's Class of 2021** will be released from the Dean's office in October. Over the past four years, QIA has supported 29 projects at Lower Manhattan Hospital and uptown WCM across six departments. We look forward to the opportunity to work with our junior faculty in GIM! The GIM iHOPE Initiative

We created this initiative to respond to the Society of Hospital Medicine's iHOPE study's findings on eleven priority areas to improve the inpatient experience. Seven of the eleven focused on the hospital-to-home transition. We called for proposals addressing one of these seven priority areas and forming teams that included at least a hospitalist, an ambulatory faculty member, and a researcher.
