Research Updates

Madeline Sterling, MD, was awarded an R01 for \$3.71M from the National Heart, Lung, and Blood Institute for her study on I-TRANSFER-HF: Improving Transitions and Outcomes for Heart Failure Patients in Home Health Care: A Type 1 Hybrid/Effectiveness Implementation Trial. The project



duration is from September 2023 - June 2028 and will test whether early visiting nurse assessment can reduce readmissions.

Monika M. Safford, MD, received \$4.5M from the National Institutes of Child Health and Human Development (NICHD) for her role as MPI of the NY Community-Hospital-Academic Maternal Health Equity Partnerships, or NY-CHAMP (see CCHEq update below). With Lauren Osborne, MD, Ob-Gyn Vice Chair for Research, she co-leads the Center's signature



project, called *Living Healthy Moms*, a randomized trial which will test whether a doula-delivered intervention can reduce post-partum depression and improve maternal cardiovascular health.

The REasons for Geographic And Racial Differences in Stroke-Myocardial Infarction-4 (REGARDS-MI-4) Study, funded by National Heart, Lung and Blood Institute, held its second annual Summer Institute at WCM from July 31 – August 1. The 30 participating investigators included teams from WCM, led by Dr. Safford; University of Alabama at Birmingham, led by Emily Levitan; and Duke, led by Barrett Bowling. Division members participating included Parag Goyal, Maddie Sterling, Lisa Kern, Laura Pinheiro, Arnab Ghosh, Ro-Jay Reid, Joanna Ringel, Mangala Rajan, Musarrat Nahid, Orysya Sorokova, Jennifer Lau, Sara Venkatnarayan, and Elizabeth Baquero. Presentations included the use of machine learning to improve cardiovascular risk prediction, stability over time of variables reflecting structural racism, structural equation modeling to examine the role of structural racism and cardiovascular disease, perspectives on aging well of patients living with a chronic condition, and factors associated with





home days following hospitalization for cardiovascular disease. The group plans to build on this work over the coming year, continuing to highlight and support the work of fellows and junior investigators. Plans are underway to develop a process for engaging community members in all our studies over the next year as a model for other observational research studies.

Cornell Center for Health Equity (CCHEq)

New York Community-Hospital-Academic Maternal Health Equity Partnerships (NY-CHAMP). WCM and Columbia successfully competed for an NICHD-funded Maternal Health Research Center of Excellence as part of NIH's Implementing a Maternal Health and Pregnancy Outcomes Vision for Everyone (IMPROVE) initiative. CCHEq and its available resources played a prominent role in the application. These centers will develop and evaluate innovative approaches to reduce pregnancy-related complications and deaths, as well as promote maternal health equity.] The NY-CHAMP aims to establish a sustainable, highly collaborative infrastructure for community-centered maternal health science in New York City and New York State. CCHEq Co-Directors Collaborate on Anti-Racist Health Policy Grant. In partnership with Robert Wood Johnson Foundation awardee Community Change, CCHEq Co-Directors Jamila Michener (PI) and Jeff Niederdeppe (Co-PI) are leading the project "Advancing a Vision for Antiracist Health Policy," focused on strengthening and expanding the emerging field of anti-racist health policy. Community Change is a national organization

that centers the leadership of people directly affected by injustice, especially people of color (total subaward \$300,000).

CCHEq Team Awarded NIH Health Equity Grant. The National Institute on Minority Health and Health Disparities has awarded \$2.3 million over four years to a CCHEq-exclusive investigator team including Co-Director Jamila Michener (PI); Research, Training and Mentoring Core Co-Associate Director Will Schpero (MPI); and members Colleen Carey (Co-I), Arnab Ghosh (Co-I), and Martin Shapiro (Co-I). "Racial and Ethnic Disparities in Access to the Medicaid Transportation Benefit and Implications for Patient Outcomes" will research the extent to which the Medicaid non-emergency medical transportation (NEMT) benefit is associated with racial/ethnic disparities in health care access and outcomes. The team aims to determine how transportation services and associated policy are related to health care disparities in the US and how they can be used to improve health equity.

Quality Improvement Academy (QIA)

Quality Improvement Academy – Weill Cornell Medicine (QIA-WCM) is proud to be in its eighth year of training junior faculty and nurses who are passionate and committed to becoming strategically vital leaders dedicated to patient care excellence through interdisciplinary process and quality improvement, QI education and mentorship, and QI research and scholarship. With 17 physicians, nurses and fellow from the departments of Medicine, Pediatrics, Emergency Medicine, Anesthesiology, Obstetrics and Gynecology, Psychiatry and NYP Nursing, this year's class joins our growing QIA network inclusive of WCM, Lower Manhattan, NYP-Queens, NYP-Brooklyn Methodist and Hospital for Special Surgery.
